








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Message from the Network Director

Renewal.

This was a year of renewal for Research Impact Canada.

We renewed the RIC Inter-Institutional Agreement for another threeyear term from 2024 to 2027. York has been invited to retain the role of Lead Institution for another three years. It was excellent working with the 37 member institutions to review and refresh the agreement and secure all member signatures. The agreement outlines the roles and responsibilities of the Lead Institution and the commitment needed from members for collective impact. It sets the stage of the next three years.

We also renewed the <u>RIC Strategic Plan 2024-2027</u>. This was an 18month process of consultation and iteration with all RIC members. The RIC Implementation Committee was instrumental in refining our priorities and how to implement them. The RIC Strategic Plan guides our work in three main areas: building capacity of members; elevating the knowledge mobilization profession; and maintaining strategic partnerships. The RIC staff are to be complimented and thanked for supporting this process.

In terms of network growth, this was another banner year for new RIC members. RIC welcomed eight new members in 2024. Due to the volume of new member requests, we will review our new member application criteria and process. This demand for knowledge mobilization services renews our commitment and affirms the significant and unique value of the Network's offerings to RIC members.

As we close this year, it is my pleasure to thank the RIC members, Committees, and the amazing RIC staff: Connie Tang, Sandy Chan, and Sophie Ashton. 2025 will see an energized RIC Network with a renewed mandate and membership. Thank you for joining us.



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Future Skills Centre

Our partnership with the Future Skills Centre (FSC) continues! This year, we hosted **three peer learning groups** (PLGs) for the FSC Community of Practice (CoP) on the following topics:

Based on the feedback received from the attendees, we learned that **our peer learning groups provide immense value to service providers in the skills development ecosystem**. Many attendees rated "**connecting with others**" as the number one reason for attending the PLGs. Attendees enjoyed being able to meet other professionals doing similar work in a more intimate setting as they could exchange ideas and find potential solutions in their line of work. Attendees also felt the PLGs **reinforced the meaningful work they did** when they met others who also felt the same way. They felt reaffirmed when hearing additional insights and ideas from others and said they would continue the conversations back at their own organizations after the sessions. Lastly, they enjoyed how **resources** were shared throughout the PLGs via links and initiatives discussed by their peers.

We look forward to continuing our contributions to FSC's knowledge mobilization mandate through these peer learning groups in the next year.



New RIC Members

Matching last year's record growth, in 2024, RIC welcomed **eight** new members to our network! The cohort of new members include two francophone and one bilingual universities, a policy think tank, two mental health centres, a university from the United Kingdom (UK), and an undergraduate-only university. We are thrilled that the diversity of our membership continues to grow.

CIGI CENTRE FOR INTERNATIONAL GOVERNANCE INNOVATION

The Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI) is an independent, nonpartisan think tank whose peer-reviewed research, foresight, and trusted analyses influence policymakers to innovate. With a network of global experts and contributors, CIGI tackles the governance challenges and opportunities of data and transformative technologies (including AI) and their impact on the economy, security, democracy, and, ultimately, societies.

IN INSTITUT NATIONAL DE LA RECHERCHE SCIENTIFIQUE

Institut national de la recherche scientifique (INRS) is a university dedicated exclusively to research and graduate training in strategic sectors in Quebec. For 55 years, it has actively contributed to Quebec's economic, social and cultural development, notably through technology transfer, knowledge mobilization, and partnerships that guide most of its research projects. It comprises four interdisciplinary research and training centers, located in Quebec City, Montreal, Laval and Varennes, focusing on strategic sectors: Centre Eau Terre Environnement, Centre Énergie Matériaux Télécommunications, Centre Urbanisation Culture Société and Centre Armand-Frappier Santé Biotechnologie.

MACEWAN UNIVERSITY

MacEwan University is a public undergraduate university. Formerly a two-year college, in 2009, it became Alberta's sixth university. A student-centered approach is emphasized through interaction between academic staff and students, blended modes of course delivery, experiential learning opportunities, an emphasis on critical thinking, and high-quality student support. The university's focus on community-based learning introduces students to a range of Albertans in their cities and towns and connects its programming with the development of competencies in demand across the province.

SAINT PAUL UNIVERSITY

Saint Paul University is the founding college of the University of Ottawa, with which it has been federated since 1965. A bilingual institution, it offers undergraduate and graduate study programs. The university is a hub for innovation through its research efforts and contributes to social, economic, and community development. Its strengths are in bridging areas of research and knowledge (e.g., Catholic and secular, English and French), as well as offering a unique angle in leadership through spirituality.

CALCED THE ROYAL OTTAWA MENTAL HEALTH

The University of Ottawa Institute of Mental Health Research (IMHR) at The Royal is one of Canada's foremost research institutes focused on mental health. By being embedded in a hospital, it works to answer research questions and mobilizes its findings seamlessly by creating Interprofessional and Interdisciplinary teams of researchers, clinicians, learners, administrative, operational staff, patients, and their families. In doing so, it is able to accelerate its mission to deliver excellence in specialized mental health care, advocacy, research, and education.



UNIVERSITY OF BRISTOL (UK)

University of Bristol consistently ranks in the world's top 100 and UK's top 10 universities when it comes to research and teaching excellence. Its mission is to make a positive impact locally, nationally, and globally by addressing society's greatest challenges through distinctive education, innovative research, and values placed on excellence, inclusivity, and partnership. The university focuses on areas of disciplinary and interdisciplinary excellence and on ensuring inclusion and equity to enable an environment that creates quality, reputation, knowledge exchange, and impact.



UNIVERSITÉ LAVAL

Université Laval (ULaval) is a research-intensive university (member of the U15 group of Canadian research universities) committed to mobilizing knowledge for the purpose of generating tangible impacts on society. ULaval has always been a driving force of societal and technological changes, a commitment reaffirmed by its new strategic plan for 2023-2028. ULaval hosts 10 institutes, 47 research centres, more than 175 research chairs, and 6 prestigious Canada Excellence Research Chairs, covering a wide range of research topics.

Waypoint Centre for Mental Health Care is an academic and teaching hospital that provides specialized mental health, addiction and geriatric care. Located on the shores of Georgian Bay, it serves some of the most complex and disadvantaged individuals in Ontario and is the sole provider of highly secure forensic mental health services in the province. The Waypoint Research Institute (WRI) is an embedded research unit supporting research both within and external to Waypoint, working towards positive change that enhances care, outcomes and experiences. This work is increasingly informed by patient voices.

Professional Development Committee

The Professional Committee will support two primary activities and two special projects for the upcoming year. The two primary activities are **MobilizeU webinars** and **KMb Exchange Program**.



MobilizeU webinars will align with the current MobilizeU course and branding and will be three webinars a year with topics informed by members. Format will vary from skillsbased to informative.



The KMb Exchange Program will continue to fund exchanges up to \$3,000 across the RIC Network in areas of skills development, capacity building, and leadership development. Successful teams will need to disseminate the outputs and outcomes across the RIC Network.

The two special projects are the **Institutional KMb Strategy Module** and the **Masterclass Module Development**.



The **Institutional KMb Strategy Module** will be a forthcoming resource and tool to help RIC members with institutional-level KMb planning.



The **Masterclass Module** will be developed in collaboration with the MobilizeU Working Group to advance the curricular developments of MobilizeU and support ongoing skills development across RIC.

RIC Committee Updates

Evaluation Committee

The Evaluation Committee has commissioned Stephen MacGregor (now Assistant Professor at University of Calgary) and his team once again to develop a paper on **Institutional KMb Strategy**. RIC members have been interviewed for their experiences and insights on strategic planning at their institution. The eventual plan is to turn the paper into a resourceful learning module with slides and worksheets as complementary planning tools.

Ongoing evaluation of the RIC Network from the Evaluation committee has also informed us of the value RIC members see in being part of RIC. Some benefits include:

Francophone and Bilingualism Committee

For the upcoming year, the Francophone and Bilingualism Committee plans to work closely with **other francophone groups in Canada to facilitate KMb activities**. We will recruit new francophone members outside of the major cities of Montreal, Quebec City, Ottawa and ensure RIC events and webinars are promoted in both languages to reflect the Network's <u>Bilingualism Guidelines</u>.

Mobilize U Committee

In 2024, the MobilizeU Committee hosted the third, annual Research Impact Canada-wide MobilizeU program. Out of 361 accepted applications, **188 (52% completion rate) participants were trained** in knowledge mobilization theory and skills from institutions across Canada, England, and all the way to Chile. The course was successfully delivered via the *Canvas* learning management system for the first time, streamlining course content and communications and automating some administrative tasks. For the first time, **two guest lectures were delivered live in French** on Zoom. **Breakout room facilitators were piloted** and survey results showed higher satisfaction with breakout rooms among participants than in previous years.

For next year, some of the core content will be remade to ensure alignment with learning outcomes. French-first sessions will remain a priority, as will the breakout room facilitators. **RIC institutions will have 10 spaces instead of 15 going forward** to accommodate a growing network and the committee will work to streamline the registration process to maximize the number of active participants in the course.

Canadian Knowledge Mobilization Forum

After several years of virtual-first events, the Canadian Knowledge Mobilization Forum (CKF) 2024 returned to in person. Held from June 19-21 in Montreal at the Grande Bibliothèque, the Forum brought together over **175 participants** for three days of networking, learning, and collaboration.



With the theme "Building Capacity for Knowledge Mobilization and Research Impact," CKF24 featured nearly 50 sessions, including lightning talks, interactive workshops, and roundtable discussions. Participants shared best practices, tools, and insights aimed at advancing the field of knowledge mobilization, emphasizing the importance of building capacity to achieve real research impact. The program featured translated, live content as well as French-first content, including French plenary and breakout sessions.

The program was designed to promote active engagement, with morning plenaries followed by interactive workshops and discussions in the afternoon. This structure allowed participants to delve deeper into key topics while also creating space for meaningful connections and collaborations across sectors. The next iteration of the Forum will be held in 2026 in Toronto!

Peter Levesque Award

This year, Research Impact Canada presented the inaugural version of the **Peter Levesque Award for Knowledge Mobilization**

Leadership. This award recognizes individuals and teams who have made significant contributions to advancing knowledge mobilization and building capacity for impactful

research. It was presented at the Canadian Knowledge Mobilization Forum 2024 held at the Grande Bibliothèque in Montreal on June 19-21, 2024. Two outstanding teams were recognized for their work.

Canadian Knowledge Mobilization Forum



Krista Jensen and **Lupin Battersby** were recognized for their work spearheading **MobilizeU**, an innovative knowledge mobilization training that has become a flagship program of Research Impact Canada. The course has successfully trained over a thousand participants, strengthening knowledge mobilization skills in both academic and community settings. The program continues to expand with plans for a full French curriculum in the works.



Équipe RENARD: Innovating Global Training in Knowledge Mobilization

The Équipe RENARD Team, led by **Christian Dagenais** and including **Esther Mc Sween-Cadieux**, **Aurélie Hot**, and **Valéry Ridde**, was awarded for their exceptional work on **Knowledge Transfer MOOCs**, which addresses the growing demand for knowledge mobilization training worldwide, particularly in low- and middle-income Francophone countries. Their efforts have made high-quality knowledge mobilization training accessible globally, with a particular focus on Francophone communities.

ACFAS Collogue

In May this year, three RIC members collaborated to host a hybrid, knowledge mobilization exchange for the pan-Canadian Francophone community at ACFAS 2024 in Ottawa with the support of the RIC Network. The initiative between the University of Ottawa (Roberto Ortiz Nunez), Université de Montréal (Elisabeth Tutschek), and Université du Québec à Montréal (Julie Médam) invited prominent keynote speakers and brought together experts and practitioners for moderated, peer learning discussions on strategies and challenges facing the Francophones community in the knowledge mobilization field. Attendance for the collogue exceeded expectations – almost 40

attendees attended the session throughout the day.

The results were built connections with various Francophone groups across Canada (leading to potential future partnerships), knowledge exchange of ideas and takeaway inspirations, and a forthcoming, bilinugal ACFAS 2024 report back.

Genome Hub - Investments in Knowledge Mobilization for **Genomics and Climate-Smart Agriculture**

This year, some RIC members successfully secured \$6.6 million in federal funding from Genome Canada to co-host two genomics hubs at the University of Guelph.

The Agricultural Genomics Action Centre will bring together participants across the genomics ecosystem, support teams in their mobilization and commercialization of project knowledge, train researchers and students, and synthesize learnings from across projects to inform agri-food policy and practice. It will be led by Elizabeth Shantz and Jessica Bowes, assistant vice-president, research (innovation and knowledge mobilization), at University of Guelph, alongside Lupin Battersby of Simon Fraser University and Nancy Tout of the Global Institute for Food Security at the University of Saskatchewan.

The Climate Smart-Data Collaboration Centre will support research data sharing, management and governance across projects by creating a data ecosystem featuring common frameworks for data exchange and sharing, community-developed data standards, open-source and reusable data processing toolkits, consensus-driven data governance, and training to develop community data competency. It will be led by Michelle Edwards, director, Agri-Food Data Canada at the University of Guelph, alongside William Hsiao of Simon Fraser University and Claude Robert of the Université Laval.

French Translation of University of Calgary's "Knowledge Engagement Impact Assessment Toolkit"

A collaboration between **Université du Québec à Montréal** (UQAM) and **University of Calgary** (UCalgary), with RIC's support, created the Frenchtranslated version of the "<u>Knowledge Engagement Impact Assessment</u> <u>Toolkit</u>." It was officially launched this year! The initiative came from UQAM, which is currently working on developing more knowledge mobilization resources in French for its faculty, staff, and students to use widely across campus. Since the official launch of the French-translated toolkit by UQAM in April this year, it has been downloaded **67** times! The French-translated toolkit is available on the RIC website for anyone to download and use.

RIC Regional Meetings - Ontario & Alberta


